Expect the unexpected: new findings about sexually transmitted infections in pregnancy from Papua New Guinea and East Africa

Should we prioritize screening and treatment for multiple sexually transmitted infections (STIs) during pregnancy to prevent poor birth outcomes? For some, the answer may seem obvious. For others, there still has not been enough research. Now, a world first trial in Papua New Guinea has produced some challenging findings about screening interventions in pregnancy. Meanwhile, frontline staff in Papua New Guinea and Zambia find inadequate attention and resources paid to established programmes, like antenatal screening for syphilis.

These pioneering studies in resource-limited settings are relevant globally for both the public health and clinical response to STIs in pregnancy.
